One: I light two candles this week


to illuminate peace.

Invitation to Communion

Words of Remembering

[We remember that Jesus was always about more chairs - for the "friendly beasts" a cow whose manger fed him, the birds that never fall unloved, and the comforting animals of his forty wilderness days.

Jesus was always about more chairs, for the poor, lonely, grieving, hungry, the most vulnerable and rejected, and even those deep in deserved regret.

And we remember that Jesus sat in the chairs of anyone who welcomed him. He came to tables and asked for food, not to see the guest list. He knew how multiply barley loaves but, also, how to grill fish.

In this sacrament on Advent's day of Peace, we remember that the starlit Child, protected by angels grew up to offer bread and cup to a betrayer, a denier, a doubter, several sleepers, many who fled because at the cross there were no angels.

We remember that Jesus is in the Bread and Cup for those of us who know its blessing well, and yet is still pulling out folding chairs so that more, ... even all can come, sit, rest, eat.]
